## GREEN BAY (3-4) at WASHINGTON (2-4)

Sunday, Oct. 31 • FedEx Field • 12 p.m. CST / 1 p.m. EST

### THIS WEEK'S NOTABLE STORYLINES:

- ▶ The Packers make their first trip to Washington D.C. in 25 years.
- ▶ Since voters elected Franklin Roosevelt to his first of four terms in 1932, the Redskins have forecasted the next President. Over the past 18 elections, a Redskins win the weekend before Election Day has preceded a win by the incumbent party. On the other hand, a Redskins loss before the vote has preceded a loss by the incumbent party.
- ▶ Brett Favre faces the team and player, the Redskins' LaVar Arrington, that nearly ended his ironman games-played streak. Arrington's sack at Lambeau Field on Oct. 20, 2002, sprained the lateral collateral ligament in Favre's knee, the quarterback's first lifetime knee injury.
- ▶ Favre plays his first game in FedEx Field, the 37th stadium in which he's competed; 15 are either no longer standing or no longer in use.
- ▶ Mark Brunell, one of 11 Favre backups to leave Green Bay and start for another NFL team, meets the club that drafted him in 1993.
- ▶ Ahman Green squares off against Clinton Portis, two of the most electric NFL running backs over the past two-plus seasons.
- ▶ The Packers look for their second win against Joe Gibbs. The only time Green Bay defeated the coach was Oct. 17, 1983, a 48-47 win on *Monday Night Football*, Gibbs' last loss before Super Bowl XVIII.

**TELEVISION:** FOX Sports, with Dan Miller (play-by-play), Brian Baldinger (color), Barry Landis (producer) and Mike Frank (director). Baldinger joined Packers Pro Bowl guard Marco Rivera in June on an NFL-sponsored USO tour, visiting American troops in Kuwait and Qatar.

**LOCAL RADIO:** Milwaukee's WTMJ (620 AM), airing Green Bay games since 1929, heads up the 62-station Packers Radio Network, with Wayne Larrivee (play-by-play) and Larry McCarren (color). The broadcast also is available to NFL Field Pass subscribers on [packers.com](http://packers.com).

**NATIONAL RADIO:** Westwood One, with Dave Sims (play-by-play), former Washington fullback John Riggins (color) and Al Smith (producer).

**ANOTHER ELECTION PUTS STREAK IN PERSPECTIVE:** Since Brett Favre launched his 196-game starting streak Sept. 27, 1992, people have moved from cassettes to CDs and 1 billion people went "on-line." The streak has encompassed the rise and fall of Martha Stewart, Beanie Babies, Ross Perot, Celine Dion and Y2K. Over the last 12-plus years, *The Bridges of Madison County*, *The Client* and *Cold Mountain* have gone from the best-seller list to the big screen to the video rental store. And, sandwiched within the streak are the O.J. Simpson trial, the first and last episodes of NBC's hit series *Friends* and Bill Clinton's two terms in office.

▶ In fact, next week will mark the fourth time during Favre's streak Americans have gone to the polls to vote for President. Clinton defeated George Bush (1992), won a second term over Bob Dole and Ross Perot (1996), and George W. Bush beat Al Gore (2000).

**BALANCED & EFFECTIVE:** Since offensive coordinator Tom Rossley underwent an angioplasty Oct. 12, Mike Sherman has served as the Packers' primary play caller, with Rossley as his chief advisor. Over the last two weeks, the Packers have outscored opponents 79-30, and outgained them 914-487. The last time the Packers scored as many as 79 points in two games was Nov. 16-23, 1997 (83). During the two-game stretch, the offense has also:

- ▶ Executed 70 rushing plays and 69 passing plays;
- ▶ Averaged 5.4 yards per carry (70-for-377);
- ▶ Completed 72.4 percent of passes (50 of 69);
- ▶ Committed zero turnovers; and
- ▶ Converted 17 of 27 third downs.

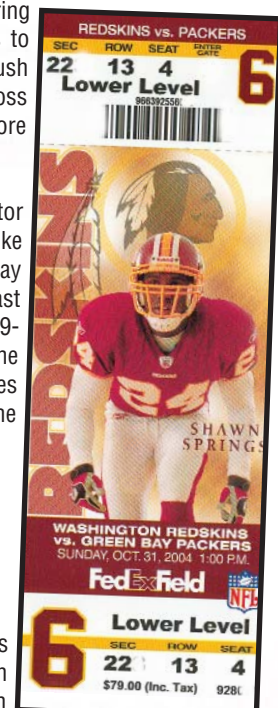
**STRENGTH VS. STRENGTH — THIRD DOWN:** This week's game pits the league's No. 1 third-down offense (Green Bay) against the NFL's top third-down defense (Washington).

- ▶ Favre on third down has a 142.6 rating over his last 19 third-down attempts (14 completions for 208 yards, one TD, no INT and 13 first downs).
- ▶ Green Bay's single-season record for third-down conversions is believed to be 1995 (108 of 220, .491). Elias Sports Bureau began officially tracking third-down conversion success in 1970, although further research by the Packers and others can't produce a higher number dating back at least 50 years.

**STONEWALL JACKSON:** Since Mike Sherman claimed Grady Jackson on waivers Nov. 4, 2003, the Packers are 8-2 in Jackson's games.

- ▶ In those 10 games, Green Bay has allowed just 3.8 yards per carry (229 rushes, 867 yards).
- ▶ In five games without Jackson (all in 2004), the Packers are 1-4, allowing 5.2 yards per carry (138 rushes, 711 yards).

**PLENTY OF MOUNTAINS ON ROAD AHEAD:** Following the Redskins game, Green Bay will need its rest after a Week 9 bye. In three of their four games after the bye, the Packers figure to play a division leader (vs. Minnesota Nov. 14, vs. St. Louis Nov. 29, at Philadelphia Dec. 5).





**BACK-TO-BACK BIG MARKET GAMES:** The last time the Packers played consecutive games against the big-market teams from the NFC East was Nov. 8-15, 1992. Brett Favre, making starts No. 6-7 in his streak, lost on the road to the Giants, then beat the Eagles in Milwaukee the following Sunday.

**BICENTENNIAL RUSHING GAMES:** Including Sunday, the Packers under Mike Sherman now have eight games of at least 200 yards rushing (nine including playoffs).

- ▶ Before Sherman arrived, the last 200-yard game was 1997.
- ▶ In fact, the Packers needed 12 seasons to reach eight 200-yard games from 1988-1999.

**CENTURY RECEIVERS I:** The Packers have had a 100-yard receiver in three consecutive games. That hasn't happened in the same season since 1998 (Antonio Freeman three games, Oct. 15-Nov. 1, 1998). The last time the Packers had at least a four-game streak was nine years ago, when they closed the season with a 100-yard receiver in five straight, Nov. 26-Dec. 24, 1995.

**CENTURY RECEIVERS II:** After going 16 games without a 100-yard receiver from Dec. 15, 2002, to Dec. 7, 2003, the Packers now have eight 100-yard efforts over their last 10 contests.

- ▶ Washington hasn't allowed a 100-yard receiver in 12 games, the second-longest active streak behind Miami (17).

**ESTABLISHING TEMPO IMPORTANT ON ROAD:** The Packers in away games under Sherman are:

- ▶ 14-3 when scoring first, and
- ▶ 15-2 with a halftime lead

#### COACHES CAPSULES

Mike Sherman: 48-28-0, .632, fifth NFL season, fifth with Packers

Joe Gibbs: 142-69-0, .673, 13th NFL season, 13th with Redskins

Head to Head: first meeting

vs. Opponent: Sherman 2-0 vs. Redskins, Gibbs 2-1 vs. Packers

**MIKE SHERMAN**...Is in his fifth year as Packers head coach, and fourth as executive vice president and general manager. Sherman also:

- ▶ Is working to lead the Packers out of an early three-game hole, just like the Boston Red Sox, the coach's favorite baseball club since his youth, did to defeat the Yankees and earn a trip to this week's World Series.
- ▶ Coached in his 75th NFL game Oct. 17, a 38-10 win at Detroit.
- ▶ Has only five career losing streaks, and one of more than two games.
- ▶ Became the last active head coach (minimum one season) to experience a three-game losing streak, on Oct. 3.
- ▶ Is now 6-0 against teams that played in the Super Bowl the previous season, including Sept. 13 at Carolina.
- ▶ Since 1970, only George Siefert, Chuck Knox and Joe Gibbs have posted a better regular-season record over their first four years as a coach.

**JOE GIBBS**...Returned this offseason as Redskins head coach, a post he previously held for 12 years (1981-92).

- ▶ The winningest coach in the team's rich history, Gibbs led Washington to four Super Bowls, winning three. In the process, he became the only NFL coach to win three Super Bowls with three starting quarterbacks. Inducted into the Canton Pro Hall of Fame in 1996.
- ▶ Served as an assistant with the Cardinals, Bucs and Chargers before joining the Redskins in 1981.
- ▶ Played tight end, offensive guard and linebacker at San Diego State, which also produced Kabeer Gbaja-Biamila.
- ▶ Left Washington at the pinnacle of his career in 1993 to spend more time with his family and NASCAR team, established in 1991. His drivers won the Daytona 500 in 1992 (Dale Jarrett) and Winston Cups in 2000 (Bobby Labonte) and 2002 (Tony Stewart).

**THE PACKERS-REDSKINS SERIES:** When the Packers first met the Redskins franchise in 1932, it was known as the Boston Braves, and Franklin D. Roosevelt was in the White House.

- ▶ Green Bay won that initial meeting, 21-0, in a year when the Packers would've claimed a fourth consecutive league championship. Before playoffs began in 1933, the NFL determined league champions based

on standings, and had tie games counted like they are today, the Packers' winning percentage would've been first. In 1933, the franchise changed its name to the Boston Redskins.

- ▶ The two clubs met several times in the early years, most memorably in the 1936 NFL championship game. That year, Redskins owner George Preston Marshall, upset with his fans' lack of support, was moving his team to Washington and didn't want to host the championship in Boston. So, the NFL moved the game to New York's Polo Grounds, where Green Bay claimed its fourth title, 21-6.
- ▶ In the other playoff meeting in the series, an NFC divisional game on Christmas Eve 1972, Bill Kilmer hit Roy Jefferson on a 32-yard TD pass, and Curt Knight kicked three field goals in a 16-3 Washington win, spoiling the Packers' Central Division crown.
- ▶ The Packers own a two-game series winning streak (2001-02), winning the only two meetings in the last 15 seasons. That streak began at Lambeau Field, Sept. 24, 2001, the historic first Monday night game after the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks. The Packers have outscored Washington 67-9 in the two games, including a 30-9 win Oct. 20, 2002, when Doug Pederson relieved an injured Favre.
- ▶ **Notable single-game career highs vs. Washington:** Kabeer Gbajabiamila, eight tackles, 10/20/02, Lambeau Field; Ahman Green, three rushing TDs, 10/20/02, Lambeau Field; David Martin, longest reception (31 yards), 9/24/01, Lambeau Field.

**NOTABLE CONNECTIONS:** Gibbs and Packers offensive coordinator **Tom Rossley** were on Frank Broyle's Arkansas staff in 1972. Packers punter **Bryan Barker** signed as an unrestricted free agent with Washington, where he spent three seasons (2001-03). Redskins safety **Matt Bowen** left Green Bay (2001-02) as a restricted free agent, March 13, 2003. The Packers drafted quarterback **Mark Brunell**, one of 11 former Brett Favre backups to leave Green Bay and start for another club, in 1993. Washington receiver **Gari Scott** spent 2003 training camp in Green Bay before knee surgery. Washington D-coordinator **Greg Blache** could become the seventh former Green Bay assistant under Mike Holmgren to become an NFL head coach (also Mike Sherman, Steve Mariucci, Andy Reid, Jon Gruden, Ray Rhodes and Dick Jauron). 'Skins linebackers coach **Dale Lindsey** coached in a similar capacity for Green Bay (1986-87). Green Bay personnel analyst **John Schneider** spent 2001 in the Redskins front office. Five Packers are from the D.C. area: **Rob Davis** (Greenbelt, Md.), **William Henderson** (Chester, Va.), **Darren Sharper** (Richmond, Va.), **Bhawoh Jue** (Chantilly, Va.), **David Martin** (Norfolk, Va.). Washington center **Cory Raymer** was **Darrell Bevell's** center at Wisconsin in the early 1990s; Bevell is now Green Bay's quarterbacks coach.

- LAST MEETING:** Oct. 20, 2002, Lambeau Field; Packers won, 30-9.
- ▶ Brett Favre, making consecutive start No. 164, sprained his left knee when LaVar Arrington sacked him in the third quarter. Carted off the sideline with Green Bay ahead 17-6, Favre learned the next day there was no serious damage to the knee, his first lifetime knee injury. He used the following bye weekend to rehab a sprained lateral collateral ligament, and resumed his starting streak Nov. 4.
  - ▶ Ahman Green rushed for a career-best three TDs, helping Green Bay (6-1) to its fifth straight victory. Green ran for 88 yards on 24 carries and scored on runs of 24, 2 and 8 yards.
  - ▶ Doug Pederson relieved Favre, the NFC's leading passer at age 33, who was carted off the sideline to a standing ovation from the then-record crowd of 63,363. Pederson was 9-of-15 for 78 yards, leading the Packers to two field goals and one touchdown in five series.

- LAST MEETING, D.C.:** Dec. 2, 1979; RFK Stadium, 'Skins won, 38-21.
- ▶ Behind John Riggins (17-88) and Joe Theismann (21-of-34, 256 yards, four TDs, INT), Washington erased a 21-7 halftime deficit, scoring 31 unanswered points.

**NFL PLAYERS NAME PACKERS CLASSIEST ORGANIZATION:** In this week's issue, *Sports Illustrated* will publish results of a poll in which the majority of NFL players chose the Green Bay Packers as the classiest organization in the league. **LONGWELL CONVERSIONS AUTOMATIC SINCE 2001:** Ryan Longwell stands just eight PATs from breaking Chris Jacke's franchise record for consecutive conversions. Jacke hit 134 straight from 1990-94. Longwell, 320-for-323 over his career, hasn't missed a PAT since the Browns blocked an attempt at Lambeau Field, Dec. 23, 2001. **THE STREAK COULD BE 40:** Favre has actually thrown for a TD in 39 of his last 40 games, since. On Oct. 20, 2002, LaVar Arrington sacked him and sprained the quarterback's lateral collateral ligament, forcing him from the game. Had Favre remained in and thrown for a TD, he could've challenged Utaas late this year. Instead, his current streak began when he shrugged off the torn ligament in his knee two years ago and returned for Green Bay's next game. Longest all-time streaks:

**SANDLOT FOOTBALL:** Najeh Davenport says he has the best arm among Green Bay's backs, but only Ahman Green (Oct. 17 at Detroit) and Tony Fisher (Sunday vs. Dallas) have thrown passes this season, both for TDs.

- ▶ Packers halfbacks over the past two games have more TD passes than a handful of NFL teams.
- ▶ Including Green and Fisher, four players have thrown for TDs, the most by a Packers team since the 1987 strike year. The last time four Packers threw TDs in a non-strike season was Bart Starr's first year as head coach, 1975 — QBs John Hadl, Don Milan and Carlos Brown, and rookie RB Willard Harrell.

**SHERMAN SINCE 2001:** Since he earned the added responsibilities of executive vice president and general manager before the 2001 season, Mike Sherman's Packers rank tied for third in the NFL with a .673 winning percentage.

- ▶ 125 total yards allowed were Green Bay's fewest since the "Snow Bowl," Dec. 1, 1985, vs. Tampa Bay (65).
- ▶ Five first downs allowed were Green Bay's fewest since the "Snow Bowl," Dec. 1, 1985, vs. Tampa Bay (five).
- ▶ 40 plays allowed were Green Bay's fewest since Dec. 3, 1972, vs. Detroit (34).
- ▶ 33 yards rushing were Green Bay's fewest since Sept. 24, 2000, at Arizona (28). Take away Joey Harrington's forced scrambles (4-for-12), two of which were essentially sacks, and the Packers allowed just 21 yards on 12 carries.
- ▶ 92 net yards passing were Green Bay's fewest since Oct. 20, 2002, vs. Washington (92).

**ONE PLAY CAN TURN AROUND SEASON:** Ultimately, the Packers' four-game losing streak began with one play. Hopefully, the season can turn around with another play in the Oct. 17 win at Detroit.

- ▶ On Sept. 19 vs. Chicago, with Green Bay poised to take a 10-7 lead on first-and-goal from the Bears' 2, Brian Urlacher pierced the Packers' blocking scheme, stripped Ahman Green and Mike Brown returned the fumble 95 yards for a touchdown. Green Bay never recovered, and lost, 21-10, launching their four-game slide.
- ▶ On Oct. 17, Darren Sharper picked off Joey Harrington and, knowing already that defensive scores usually win NFL games, leaped over Dominic Raiola on a passionate return to the end zone. The play, at a crucial time in the third quarter, gave the Packers a 24-10 lead.

**PRIME PROTECTION:** The Packers went 186 passing plays without a sack, a mark the *Green Bay Press-Gazette* reported as a franchise record, from Sept. 26 to Sunday.

- ▶ Over a longer stretch, Green Bay has given up just two sacks over its last 253 passing plays, a stretch that began on kickoff weekend, Sept. 13 at Carolina.
- ▶ Overall this season, Green Bay's offensive line ranks first in sacks allowed per passing play (1 sack every 68.8 plays).

**SCHEDULE BREAKDOWN:** While stung from their most disappointing start in 13 years, no one in the Packers organization has given up on the season. There weren't many positives from the first five weeks, but there

might be a lot over the balance of the year. Odds are stacked high (only eight teams have made the playoffs after starting 1-4), but there is an opportunity to make up ground. Including Sunday, Green Bay's remaining 10 games look like this:

- ▶ Four of their six head-to-head contests against division foes, including two against the 4-1 Vikings, remain in front of the Packers. Green Bay is 1-1 against the division.
- ▶ Eight of the 12 games within the conference remain, excluding the team's three wins, at defending NFC champion Carolina Sept. 13, Oct. 17 at Detroit and Sunday vs. Dallas. The Packers are 3-2 against the NFC.
- ▶ Two of their four AFC contests were played in the first five weeks.
- ▶ Green Bay is 17-2 in regular-season games Dec. 1 or later since 2000.

**JAVON SKYWALKER:** Javon Walker is in the early stages of having one of the finest statistical seasons this team has ever seen.

- ▶ Walker leads the NFL with 726 receiving yards.
- ▶ Coming into this season, Walker had recorded just one 100-yard receiving game in his first 31 career contests. The 25-year old has now gone over the century mark in four of the team's last six contests, including a 200-yard outburst at Indianapolis in Week 3.

**PUNT PROTECTION:** The Packers haven't had a punt blocked in more than nine years, since Sept. 11, 1995, at Chicago, where the Bears' Anthony Marshall blocked Craig Hentrich.

- ▶ Josh Bidwell, who signed in March as an unrestricted free agent with Tampa Bay, left with the team's longest individual streak without a block: 308, from 2000-03.

## WHAT TO LOOK FOR SUNDAY —

### DONALD DRIVER:

- Needs one reception for career No. 200.

### BRETT FAVRE:

- Will play in a 199th consecutive game (218 including playoffs) and make his 197th consecutive start (216 including playoffs), 81 more than the next-closest streak on the all-time quarterbacks list, 116 by Ron Jaworski (1977-84).
- Can extend his streak of games with a TD pass to 33, the NFL's second-longest streak behind Johnny Unitas' 47-game stretch (1956-60), one of the most revered marks in sports history.
- Needs 11 completions to surpass No. 2 John Elway (4,123) on the all-time list. Favre enters Sunday with 4,113.

### BUBBA FRANKS:

- Needs one reception to surpass No. 5 Ron Kramer (170) and six to surpass No. 4 Rich McGeorge (175) on the team's all-time tight ends list. Franks enters Sunday with 170.
- Needs one touchdown reception to tie No. 2 Ed West (25) on the team's all-time tight ends list. Franks enters Sunday with 24.

### KABEER GBAJA-BIAMILA:

- Needs 3.5 sacks to surpass Ezra Johnson (41.5, 1982-87) for third all-time in Green Bay history. He enters Sunday with 38.5.

### AHMAN GREEN:

- Will play in his 100th career NFL game.
- Needs 69 receiving yards to surpass No. 2 Dorsey Levens (2,079) on the all-time list among backs. Green enters Sunday with 2,011.
- Needs four overall TDs to tie No. 4 Paul Hornung (62) on the all-time Green Bay list. Green enters Sunday with 58.

### WILLIAM HENDERSON:

- Will play in his 150th career NFL game.
- Needs 95 receiving yards for 2,000 career.

### GRADY JACKSON:

- Will play in his 100th career NFL game.

### RYAN LONGWELL:

- Already the franchise's all-time leader, needs 10 points for 900 career.

### DARREN SHARPER:

- Needs one touchdown to surpass both Bobby Dillon and Doug Hart (five) for second on the team's defensive TD list. Herb Adderley leads with seven defensive TD. Sharper enters Sunday with five.

**LAST WEEK:** The Packers won their second straight game, a 41-20 win over Dallas. Notes from Sunday's contest:

- The Packers have put together three consecutive 400-yard games for the first time since they did it four games in a row in 1989 (Sept. 17 - Oct. 8). Green Bay accumulated 486 total offensive yards vs. Dallas.
- Brett Favre played in his 200th career NFL game, and his 100th career NFL home contest (including 1991 with Atlanta). There are only 21 other

active NFL players have accomplished the feat. The only other quarterback who has played 200 or more games is Dallas' Vinny Testaverde, who played in his 207th contest.

- Ahman Green's 90-yard TD run was the third-longest run from scrimmage in team history. Green holds the record with a 98-yard TD run vs. Denver, Dec. 28, 2003. Andy Uram ran for a 97-yard score vs. Chicago, Oct. 8, 1939.
- Green is now just the second player in league history to have two career touchdown runs of 90 yards or more. Bo Jackson is the other, with both of his runs during the 1987 season.
- Green now has 27 career 100-yard games, breaking Hall of Famer Jim Taylor's franchise record, 26.

**BETWEEN THE HASH MARKS:** Key plays and notes not necessarily in Sunday's boxscore:

- The Packers immediately felt the impact of Grady Jackson, making his first start since Week 1. The big nose tackle made four plays on the first two defensive series. On the game's third play, Jackson threw Richie Anderson for a 1-yard loss. Later in the same drive, he tied up several linemen, allowing Na'il Diggs to stop Eddie George for no gain. On the Cowboys' second drive, he tackled George on a 1-yard play and clogged up the line on the ensuing running play. In the second quarter, Jackson deflected a third-and-4 pass, but a delay-of-game penalty wiped it out.
- The Packers scored on their first seven possessions, and didn't punt until 9:26 left in the game.
- Field position and third-down conversions were key in that offensive success. Against the NFL's No. 1 kickoff coverage unit entering the game, the Packers' average start after the first four Dallas kickoffs was the 37-yard line. Green Bay converted nine of its first 11 third downs.
- Before leaving in the second quarter with a sprained knee, Darren Sharper made a smart play in the Cowboys' end zone. On a pass from WR Terry Glenn, Sharper probably could've intercepted the ball, but instead swatted it away from Keyshawn Johnson.
- On the same drive, Al Harris knocked down a pass in the end zone after blanket coverage on Johnson. The Cowboys settled for a field goal.
- Playing without Sharper, the quarterback of their defense, Green Bay held Dallas to punts on four of the first five possessions after Sharper left, late in the first quarter.
- Torrance Marshall pounced on Najeh Davenport's fumble on a first-quarter kickoff return. Trailing 6-3, Marshall's quick thinking saved field position and possession, The Packers went on to score a TD and take a lead they would not relinquish.
- On that drive, Green set up his own TD, on a 32-yard run. Launching the second quarter, Green picked up a Nick Luchey block, and beat four defenders at the line, using a great cut. Mike Wahle sealed off the Cowboys linemen. Three plays later, Green got lower than Greg Ellis at the goal line to propel himself into the end zone.
- With 5 minutes left in the first half, Green reversed his field, broke a La'Roi Glover tackle in the backfield, picked up a block from Favre (on 284-pound Kenyon Coleman), then drove Al Singleton 2 yards over the first-down line. Rather than a third-and-long, the Packers had a first down on their way to a touchdown, and a commanding 17-6 lead.
- Antonio Chatman was 2-for-2 on big offensive plays, netting needed yardage at critical times on arguably the game's most important drive. First, he adjusted to a quick pass thrown behind him and converted a huge third-and-7. Later in the same march, his 18-yard run, thanks in

- part to a solid Donald Driver block, gave Green Bay the ball at the Cowboys' 10, and set up Favre's 5-yard TD pass to Javon Walker.
- ▶ Until Richie Anderson's 27-yard run in the fourth quarter, the Packers had held Dallas to just 17 yards on the ground. The week before, the Green Bay defense held Detroit to 50 yards rushing.
- ▶ On Green's 90-yard TD run, on a toss sweep, Bubba Franks (Dexter Coakley) and Grey Ruegamer (Dat Nguyen) provided key blocks, then Green out-sprinted safety Tony Dixon to the goal line.
- ▶ Ryan Longwell since Oct. 11 when Bryan Barker began holding for the injured Doug Pederson, is five-for-five, including 50- and 53-yarders.
- ▶ Bryan Barker has hit 790 straight punts without a block (his last was with Kansas City, Dec. 12, 1993, at Denver, by Reggie Rivers).

- 28-6 (.824) on the road.
- ▶ Seven of his last eight 100-plus games have come on the road. And, 10 of his last 12 have come in enemy environments.
- ▶ Including Sept. 26, four of his six career losses have come in domes. In other words, Favre played well enough to win, and had more bounces gone Green Bay's way, the quarterback could have been just 17-18 in domes (rather than 13-22).
- ▶ In 2003, Favre totaled six 100-plus games, and two of them were in domes, a loss at St. Louis and a critical win at Minnesota.
- ▶ Two of his six career losses have come in Indy, including Nov. 16, 1997, when he hit 120.4 (18-of-25, 363 yards, three TDs, two INTs) in a 41-38 loss to the Colts.

**NOT YOUR AVERAGE INJURY:** Commissioner Paul Tagliabue was among countless Americans concerned about Brett Favre's injury after the Oct. 3 game. On behalf of the commissioner, the league office phoned the Packers that night to inquire on Favre's condition.

**LONGEST PLAYING STREAKS:** Cornerback Al Harris played in his 100th consecutive NFL game Oct. 3. Meanwhile, Mike Flanagan's 82-game streak came to an end, when the club placed him on injured reserve Oct. 2 with debilitating knee tendinitis. Longest active Packers playing streaks entering the week:

**LAST PLACE FOR FIRST TIME IN 16 YEARS:** Earlier in October, the Packers were alone in last place for the first time since 1988.

- ▶ The last time Green Bay was alone in last place after at least three games was Dec. 18, 1988, after a season ending road win over the Phoenix Cardinals. The Packers finished fifth in the NFC Central. Lindy Infante won Coach of the Year the following season.

**TURNOVER TALK:** Beginning with their Thanksgiving loss at Detroit last season, over their last 14 games, including playoffs, the Packers are 7-0 when finishing ahead in turnover margin, and 1-6 when tied or behind in turnover margin.

**TURNOVERS TAKE AWAY WINS:** The Packers under Mike Sherman are now 32-3 (19-0 at home) when committing one or fewer turnovers.

- ▶ Including their three 2004 wins, they're also 12-0 under Sherman in turnover-free games. Over a longer stretch, the team has won 18 straight zero-turnover contests, dating to a loss at Minnesota, Dec. 1, 1997.
- ▶ Since an Oct. 21, 2001, loss at Minnesota, the Packers have won 24 straight when ahead in turnover margin. Overall under Sherman, the Packers are 34-1.
- ▶ However, during the Sherman era, when Green Bay is minus in turnover margin, the Packers are 6-22.

**ANOTHER NAME JOINS THE QB LIST:** Tampa Bay's Chris Simms made his first NFL start Oct. 10 at New Orleans. Meanwhile, Pittsburgh's Ben Roethlisberger made his first NFL start Sept. 26, and the 49ers' Ken Dorsey made his first NFL start at quarterback Sept. 19 at New Orleans.

- ▶ Simms became the 176th quarterback to start an NFL game since Brett Favre launched his current starting streak, Sept. 27, 1992.
- ▶ Cincinnati's Carson Palmer became the first 2004 name on the list, starting in Week 1.



**REBOUND PERCENTAGE:** Since 1993, no other team has proven more resilient after playoff losses. Over the previous 10 seasons (1993-2002), the lifetime of the salary cap and free agency, the Packers have the best postseason “rebound percentage.”

- ▶ Only once in seven chances during the stretch have the Packers failed to answer a playoff loss with a return to the postseason (.857).
- ▶ Green Bay has compiled that rebound percentage during an era when nearly half of postseason clubs miss the playoffs the following season. Of the 120 playoff teams from 1993-2002, 56 (46.7 percent) didn't reach the playoffs the next year. Even the Patriots missed the playoffs following their Super Bowl XXXVI championship.

#### PACKERS TRENDS:

- ▶ Brett Favre has thrown for a TD in 39 of his last 40 games; the streak began in Week 17, 2001. During the stretch, the only club to hold Favre without a TD pass was Washington, Oct. 20, 2002; during that contest, LaVar Arrington sacked Favre and sprained the quarterback's lateral collateral ligament, forcing him from the game.
- ▶ Javon Walker has caught at least one pass in 24 straight games and 34 of the last 35. The last time he went without a reception was vs. Buffalo, Dec. 22, 2002, a 10-0 win dominated by defense.
- ▶ Ryan Longwell has converted 35 consecutive field goals inside 40 yards. The last time he missed a kick of 39 yards or less was Oct. 7, 2002, at Chicago (Champaign), a 35-yarder. Longwell also has hit 127 straight PAT attempts, dating to 2001.
- ▶ The Packers have scored a touchdown in 68 consecutive games; the team could tie the franchise record of 75 games (1992-97) in Week 14. The last team to hold Green Bay without a touchdown was Philadelphia, Sept. 17, 2000 — Mike Sherman's first NFL victory, 6-3.

### Non-losing season streaks, NFL history

In 2001, the Packers captured the NFC's longest active streak of non-losing seasons, now 12. Green Bay's last sub-.500 campaign was 1991 (4-12). The Packers, who've now accomplished it three times, are the only team ever to do it more than twice (and that does not include the Lombardi era)...

# PACKERS, REDSKINS SHARE RICH COACHING PAST, HIGHEST-SCORING GAME IN TEAM ANNALS

The Packers' rivalry with the Washington Redskins, spanning eight decades, is something of a paradox.

Theirs is one of the National Football League's oldest series, dating back to 1932 and Franklin Delano Roosevelt's arrival in the White House. Yet, they have met only 28 times over that 71-year span.

Nonetheless, they share significant NFL and major mutual history - including the highest scoring game in the Packers' 85-year annals.

For earliest example, they were the principals in the fourth league championship game ever played - in 1936, when the Redskins were in the process of moving from Boston to the nation's capital and thus were no longer welcome in Beantown, "requiring" that the Skins transfer the title contest to New York's Polo Grounds.

The Packers had the better of it in that matchup - on Dec. 13, 1936, when FDR was closing out his first term in Washington - posting a decisive, 21-6 victory in the "Big Apple."

In the 67-year interim, they also have shared the two most successful coaches in Green Bay's history - founder Curly Lambeau and latter day "savior" Vince Lombardi. After winning 11 NFL championships between them in Green Bay, they subsequently left Titletown to serve as head coaches of the Redskins during a 20-year span, Lambeau in 1952-53 and Lombardi in 1969.

More recently, the Packers and the Redskins combined forces to stage what remains the premier shootout in the history of "Monday Night Football" - as well as the highest scoring game in Green Bay' storied annals - the Green and Gold prevailing, 48-47, via Jan Stenerud's last-minute field goal.

And just three years ago, the Redskins were the Packers' Lambeau Field opponents when NFL teams returned to regular season play in 2001 after a one-week hiatus dedicated to dealing with the incredible aftermath to the '9-11' tragedy, a somber and highly emotional occasion for both players and fans alike.

Next Sunday's 29th meeting between the teams, incidentally, will in itself be somewhat historic. It will find the Packers paying their first visit to Washington in 25 years - since 1979.

Sunday's showdown, by the way, will be only the sixth meeting between the teams since that '79 contest, won by the Redskins, 38-21.

Overall, the Packers lead what has been a closely contested series, 15-12. There also has been one tie, a 7-7 standoff played at Green Bay's "old" City Stadium in 1933 - the year after the rivalry was launched. Sunday's principals are 1-1 in postseason play, the Redskins having gained a modicum of revenge for that championship game defeat in 1936 by posting a 16-3 victory in their 1972 divisional playoff game at Washington's RFK Stadium.

In that '36 title game, staged in front of 29,545 fans, then second-year pro Don Hutson was the catalyst - as he often proved to be over a legendary, 11-year career. The "Alabama Antelope" caught a 48-yard touchdown pass from Arnie Herber in the first three minutes and the Packers never trailed.

Green Bay's two second-half scores were set up, respectively, by a 52-yard pass from Herber to Johnny Blood and when Lon Evans blocked a punt.

It was, for the record, the Packers' third victory over the Redskins during the '36 season. They had defeated the Skins, 31-2, in Green Bay on Oct. 11 and again prevailed in a much closer rematch in Boston (Nov. 8), 7-3.

The Packers' memorable "Monday Night Football" shootout with the Redskins at Lambeau Field in '83 was an obvious "ball" for the fans (55,255 of the faithful sat in on the occasion) and, unquestionably, a spectacular smorgasbord for statisticians.

Taking on the defending Super Bowl champions Skins on that October



evening, the Packers prevailed in a contest featuring 11 touchdowns, 11 extra points and 6 field goals.

In the high-scoring process, the principals amassed 1,025 yards of offense, the Redskins weighing in with 552 and the Packers with 473.

Washington quarterback Joe Theismann passed for 398 yards and two touchdowns, via 27 completions in 39 attempts, and the Packers' Lynn Dickey, hitting on 22 of 31 attempts, was similarly productive, throwing for 387 yards and three touchdowns.

Dickey's two primary targets, tight end Paul Coffman and running back Gerry Ellis, emerged as 100-yard receivers, Coffman snaring six passes for 124 yards and Ellis four for 105 yards.

Not surprisingly, each team punted only once during the see-saw pointfest. Stenerud's 20-yard field goal with 54 seconds left decided the issue, although the result was to remain in doubt until the end. The Redskins' Mark Moseley missed a 39-yard field goal attempt - his kick sailed wide right - as time expired.

Lambeau, who had led the Packers to six NFL championships and over 200 victories, did not enjoy success during his two-year tenure in Washington, exiting the Redskins' headquarters with a record of 10 wins, 13 losses and one tie.

One of those 13 losses came at Green Bay's hands in 1952, when the Packers - coached by Gene Ronzani, Lambeau's successor, dispatching Curly's Redskins at Marquette Stadium in Milwaukee, 35-20.

It was the only time Lambeau faced his former team in a regular-season game after leaving Green Bay. He had coached the then-Chicago Cardinals in 1950-51, immediately upon leaving Packers following the 1949 season, but was to face the Packers only in preseason contests as the Cardinals' field leader -- in both 1950 and '51, the Packers winning both games by a 17-14 score.

Curly did subsequently split a pair of preseason contests with the Packers while head coach of the Redskins, losing a 13-7 decision to Green Bay in a game at Kansas City in 1952 and posting a 13-6 victory at old City Stadium in 1953 - the last time he was to coach against the Packers.

Lombardi, who had resigned as Green Bay's general manager following the '68 season (he had stepped down as head coach after the 1967 campaign), had better fortune in Washington than Lambeau.

In 1969, the only season he was to serve as Washington's coach before being felled by colon cancer, he escorted the Redskins to their first winning season in 15 years, forging a 7-5-2 mark. He died Sept. 3, 1970, at the age of 57.

The Packers did not face Washington during Lombardi's lone season with the Redskins.
