## MINNESOTA (4-5) at GREEN BAY (2-7) Mon., Nov. 21 • Lambeau Field • 8 p.m. CST • ABC

### THIS WEEK'S NOTABLE STORYLINES:

- ▶ With memories of Antonio Freeman's incredible overtime catch to defeat the Vikings in 2000, *Monday Night Football* returns to Green Bay to televise one of the NFL's fiercest rivalries.
- ▶ Two clubs slow out of the gates are each coming off enormous road victories against quality teams.
- ▶ In the rain on Nov. 6, 2000, Freeman somehow caught Favre's deflected pass on the ground, after battling Cris Dishman, then got up and turned the play into a 43-yard score.
- ▶ It's Minnesota's first trip to Lambeau Field since the Vikings ended Green Bay's 2004 season in the playoffs, 31-17. It's also Minnesota's first trip to Green Bay with former Packers safety Darren Sharper.

**NATIONAL TELEVISION:** ABC's *Monday Night Football* will air the contest. Al Michaels, who has called more memorable events than any American sportscaster since joining ABC in 1976, teams up in the booth with analyst John Madden, a finalist for the Pro Football Hall of Fame's Class of 2006. Sam Ryan, a college sideline reporter since 2002 continues to pinch-hit for Michele Tafoya, who is on maternity leave. Fred Gaudelli is the producer, Drew Esocoff directs and Elias Sports Bureau's Steve Hirdt heads up the statistics. A Packers game will air to the largest possible audience for the 21st time since 2004.

**INTERNATIONAL TELEVISION:** In addition, **ESPN International** will broadcast the contest in three languages to more than 180 countries.

**NATIONAL RADIO:** CBS Radio Sports/Westwood One will air the game in English from Green Bay, with Marv Albert (play-by-play), Boomer Esiason (color), John Dockery (sideline) and Jim Gray (pregame/halftime). Plus, announcers Clemson Smith Muniz, Alfredo Bejar and Armando Alavera will broadcast the game in Spanish from New York City.

**PACKERS RADIO:** Milwaukee's **WTMJ** (620 AM), airing Green Bay games since 1929, heads up the 62-station Packers Radio Network, with versatile Wayne Larrivee (play-by-play) and two-time Packers Pro Bowler Larry McCarren (color). Spanning five states, the network covers 50 markets in the upper Midwest. The broadcast also is available to NFL Field Pass subscribers on [packers.com](http://packers.com).

**RARE 100 FROM PACKERS ROOKIE:** Samkon Gado Sunday at Atlanta became the first Green Bay rookie to top 100 yards rushing since De'Mond Parker, Dec. 5, 1999, at Chicago (113 yards on 19 carries). Prior to Parker, the last rookie to do it was Gado's position coach, Edgar Bennett (in 1992).



- ▶ However, Gado is the team's first nondrafted rookie to reach the mark since Kevin Wilhite (16-100), Oct. 18, 1987, vs. Philadelphia.
- ▶ In Packers history, 42 players now have rushed for 100 yards. The franchise has 159 such individual efforts.

**SPOTLIGHT RECEIVER:** During Brett Favre's 13-year-old starting streak, 76 players have caught at least one pass from the future Hall of Famer. You'd be hard-pressed, however, to find a more reliable receiver in that group than Donald Driver.

- ▶ A seventh-round draft choice in 1999, Driver has again shrugged off extra on-field attention created by injuries — this year to Javon Walker and Robert Ferguson — to rank among the league's leading receivers (tied for eighth with 51 catches, eighth with 710 yards).
- ▶ And this week, with only one catch, Driver can join exclusive company. He would extend his streak of games with a reception to 58 and tie the third-longest stretch in Packers history (Hall of Famer James Lofton). Next up would be current running backs coach Edgar Bennett (60) and all-time leader Sterling Sharpe (103).
- ▶ The last time Driver did not catch a pass was Dec. 30, 2001, vs. Minnesota. Driver did, however, score his only career rushing touchdown that day.
- ▶ Driver also stands just six catches from 300 career (all in a Packers uniform). The team's all-time leaders in receptions:

**SPEAKING OF DRIVER:** The receiver Sunday made 2005 his fourth career 50-reception season. Only four other players in team history (James Lofton and Sterling Sharpe with seven, and Antonio Freeman and Ahman Green with six) have as many.

► Driver also is attempting to become only the fourth player in Packers history with three career 1,000-yard receiving seasons. He would join James Lofton (5), Sterling Sharpe (5) and Antonio Freeman (3).

**PADDING ANOTHER NFL RECORD:** Brett Favre needs four TD passes to extend his NFL-record streak of consecutive 20-TD-pass seasons to 12.

**DOUBLE-FIGURE DRIVES:** If the Packers are fortunate to get the ball with a late lead, expect them to be extremely stingy.

► In Sunday's win at Atlanta, Green Bay orchestrated three drives of at least 10 plays, including bookend possessions to close the first half and open the second half (both resulting in significant field goals). Then, after the Falcons moved to within one score at 23-17 early in the fourth quarter, the Packers embarked on a 10-play march that consumed 6 minutes, 7 seconds, and kicked another key field goal.

**LONGWELL SOLID FROM LONG RANGE:** In Sunday's 33-25 win at Atlanta, Ryan Longwell for the first time in his career hit multiple field goals of at least 50 yards. In one game, the veteran nailed more 50-yarders than he had during every season of his career except 2000 (three) and 2004 (two).

► This season, Longwell has established a career-best with four field goals from that distance, edging his 2000 best. He's hit four of five from 50-plus this season.

► With 13 career field goals of 50-plus yards, Longwell stands four behind

### COACHES CAPSULES

**Mike Sherman:** 57-38-0, .600, sixth NFL season, sixth with Packers

**Mike Tice:** 28-33-0, .459, four-plus NFL seasons (all with Vikings)

**Head to Head:** Tied, 4-4

**vs. Opponent:** Sherman 7-5 vs. Vikings; Tice 4-4 vs. Packers

**MIKE SHERMAN**... Is in his sixth year as the Packers' 13th head coach.

► Is no stranger to adversity, having overcome several hurdles each of the past three seasons to win a trio of NFC North titles.

► Since the 1993 collective bargaining agreement, teams have made 84 coaching changes and only Sherman's tenure has produced winning records in each of its first five seasons.

► Over their first five regular seasons as an NFL coach, since 1970 only Chuck Knox, George Seifert, Joe Gibbs and Mike Ditka produced better records than Sherman (53-27, .663).

► In 2004, his team became only the ninth in NFL history to reach the playoffs after a 1-4 start. In 2005, is attempting to steer his club to the playoffs after an 0-4 start; since 1990, only the 1992 Chargers have accomplished that feat.

► Has led the Packers to three straight division titles and four consecutive playoff appearances.

► Is 6-0 against teams in the Super Bowl the previous season.

**MIKE TICE**... Officially named the Vikings' sixth head coach Jan. 10, 2002.

► In 2004, led the team to its first playoff berth and first postseason victory since 2000.

► Has been associated with the team since 1992, playing tight end from 1992-93 and 1995, coaching the tight ends in 1996 and the offensive line from 1997-2001. Tice added the title of assistant head coach for the 2001 season and was made the interim head coach for the Vikings' last regular season game of the 2001 season against Baltimore.

► Tice is the first Vikings alumni player to hold the title of the franchise's head coach. In five seasons coaching the offensive line, Tice guided five players to 10 Pro Bowl appearances.

► Played quarterback at the University of Maryland from 1977-1980.

► Over his 14-year NFL career, Tice caught 107 passes for 894 yards and 11 touchdowns. Tice played three seasons with the Vikings (1992-93, 1995), 10 years with the Seattle Seahawks (1981-88, 1990-91), and one season with the Washington Redskins (1989), making 109 starts in 177 games played.

**THE PACKERS-VIKINGS SERIES:** Few, if any, rivalries in sports have exhibited more parity. These clubs have split 89 meetings overall (44-44-1).

► Of late, the Packers have held a slight edge, 7-5 since Mike Sherman took Green Bay's reins in 2000.

► In 2003, the home clubs in the series were 0-2. The last time that happened was 1991.

► Over the last 11 seasons (1994-2004), these teams have accounted for nine division championships (NFC Central 1994-2001, NFC North 2002-04).

**NOTABLE CONNECTIONS:**...Fifth in Packers history with 36 interceptions, Vikings safety Darren Sharper spent his first eight NFL seasons (1997-2004) in Green Bay...Minnesota coverage coordinator Chuck Knox Jr. spent the '99 season as the Packers' defensive assistant/quality control...Packers DT Colin Cole originally signed with Minnesota as a rookie free agent in 2003 and spent separate one-week stints on the Vikings' 53-man roster that season...Packers RB ReShard Lee spent a few days with the Vikings at the end of the 2005 preseason...Green Bay TE Donald Lee and Minnesota CB Fred Smoot were teammates at Mississippi State...Green Bay director of research and development Mike Eayrs (similar capacity, 1985-99) previously worked for the Vikings...T Bryant McKinnie (Vikings) and TE Bubba Franks (Packers) were college teammates at Miami (Fla.)...Minnesota's head trainer Chuck Barta and Packers assistant trainer Kurt Fielding were classmates at the University of Wisconsin-La Crosse...Vikings running back Michael Bennett rushed for 1,681 yards in his only season as a Wisconsin starter, 2000, second in Badger history; a former Milwaukee Tech High School star, Bennett's uncle is former Packer Tony Bennett...Other Wisconsin Badgers ties include Vikings RB coach Dean Dalton (assistant 1986-87) and All-American DE Erasmus James (2001-04).

**LAST MEETING (AP):** Oct. 23, 2005, Metrodome; Vikings won, 23-20.

- ▶ Prodded by Mike Tice's stern halftime speech, the Vikings came back from a 17-0 deficit to beat Green Bay 23-20. Paul Edinger kicked a career- and franchise-long 56-yard field goal as time ran out, lifting momentum-starved Minnesota past the Packers.
- ▶ After a flawless first half by Packers quarterback Brett Favre, Daunte Culpepper (23 for 31, 280 yards, two TDs, no INTs) came to life.
- ▶ Ryan Longwell tied it at 20 with 24 seconds remaining on a 39-yard kick after missing two earlier field goals for the Packers. After the kick-off, Culpepper threw a 14-yard pass to Mewelde Moore and a 12-yard pass to Robinson — who stepped out and stopped the clock with 2 seconds left on the Green Bay 38.
- ▶ Favre was busy thinking about overtime when he turned to watch Edinger's winner. His teammates were just as shocked. And the Packers returned to Wisconsin in much worse shape. Carted off with severe injuries were receiver Robert Ferguson (knee, second quarter) and running back Ahman Green (quadricep tendon, fourth quarter).
- ▶ Culpepper was constantly under pressure in the first half and Green Bay notched five sacks.
- ▶ Green Bay took a 7-0 lead early in the second quarter when Donald Driver made a 22-yard catch in the corner of the end zone by cradling the ball against his right elbow.
- ▶ Driver broke four tackles on a 40-yard play that set up a 4-yard TD toss from Favre to Antonio Chatman late in the second quarter that made it 14-0. Koren Robinson returned the subsequent kickoff 72 yards, but Nick Barnett forced a Moore fumble on the next play and Kabeer Gbaja-Biamila recovered.

**LAST MEETING, LAMBEAU FIELD (AP):** Jan. 9, 2005, Lambeau Field; Vikings won, 31-17.

- ▶ Randy Moss caught two TD passes and the Vikings rolled to an upset victory over the stunned Packers. Green Bay had swept the season series, including a last-second victory at the Metrodome two weeks prior to clinch the NFC North crown.
- ▶ But Daunte Culpepper threw four TDs — giving him 11 and no interceptions against Green Bay on the season — and the Vikings picked off four Brett Favre passes after managing only 11 interceptions all season.
- ▶ Minnesota scored on its first three possessions, jumping out to a 17-0 lead in avenging two 34-31 losses to the Packers, who entered the playoffs as the NFC's hottest team.
- ▶ The Packers lost Pro Bowl receiver Javon Walker in the first half and left tackle Chad Clifton in the third quarter, but pulled to 24-17 on Najeh Davenport's 1-yard plunge with 13:37 left. Then two costly Packers infractions set up Culpepper's 34-yard touchdown toss to Moss, giving the Vikings a 14-point cushion with 10:18 remaining.

**WALK-OFF FIELD GOALS:** Green Bay and Minnesota have decided their last three regular-season games with a field goal at the end of the fourth quarter.

- ▶ According to Elias Sports Bureau, since 1990, only three series have experienced such late-game dramatics as often (game-ending field goal in either overtime or with no time left in regulation).

**MORE GAMEDAY BIRTHDAYS:** Hoping to continue a positive trend started by Samkon Gado at Atlanta Sunday, defensive lineman Kenny Peterson will suit up on his birthday — his 27th — Monday night. The Vikings game also marks a birthday for offensive line coach Larry Beightol. And, next month in the team's final Monday night appearance Dec. 19 at Baltimore, Head Coach Mike Sherman will coach in a game for his second straight birthday.

**THIRD-DOWN OFFENSE:** The Packers are 16-for-their-last-33 on third-down conversions and enter the weekend tied for second in the league overall.

- ▶ In the red zone, the Packers are 7-for-14 (.500) on third down, tied with the Bucs for the third-best percentage in the league behind the Colts and Panthers.

**A LONG ROAD BACK:** One year ago, Minnesota and Green Bay ranked 2-3, respectively, among NFL passing offenses, trailing only the storybook season of Peyton Manning and the Indianapolis Colts.

- ▶ This week, the Packers have cracked the Top 5, entering the contest fifth in the NFL with 326.1 net passing yards per game.
- ▶ That achievement is significant, considering the club lost its leading 2004 receiver (Pro Bowler Javon Walker, Week 1) and a promising rookie (Terrence Murphy, Week 4) to season-ending injuries. Plus, throw in the loss of key passing-game cogs Ahman Green and Robert Ferguson — neither has played since Oct. 23 at Minnesota — and the ranking looks even more impressive.

**STILL A NO-SACK ZONE:** Another aspect of that fifth-ranked passing offense, one that has been mostly lost in the team's 2-7 start, is the team's ability to consistently protect Brett Favre. Despite losing both starting guards before the season to free agency, and playing without Pro Bowl center Mike Flanagan for most of three games due to injury, the Packers' line has protected extremely well.

- ▶ The Packers did not allow a sack over 150 passing attempts, a streak that covered most of four full games. It began after their first possession Oct. 3 at Carolina and ended on their last possession Oct. 30 at Cincinnati.
- ▶ Only two NFL teams have allowed fewer sacks in 2005:

**TOP FOUR INCLUDES FAVRE, TWO VIKINGS:** Brett Favre Oct. 23 at Minnesota started his 211th consecutive game, surpassing the fourth-longest starting streak on record (Oakland's ironman center Jim Otto, 1960-74).

- ▶ Only about half the NFL teams publish consecutive starts in their records section, partly because early press-box statisticians did not universally and consistently document starting lineups.
- ▶ Even Favre's own team cannot confirm whether his starting streak is the longest in club history, because lineups were not recorded at every home and road game before 1962.
- ▶ Favre's streak (214) is nearly a full-season longer than the next-closest active stretch, Will Shields' 200. Jamie Sharper's 129-game starting streak, the fifth-longest active stretch, ended Nov. 13.

**A NATIONAL TEAM:** Continuing to garner strong ratings, both locally and nationally, the Packers earned four **prime-time** kickoffs for the second straight season.

- ▶ Five of the Packers' last seven games are expected to attract national television. Green Bay's last four games, vs. Detroit on Sunday night, Dec. 11, at Baltimore on Monday, Dec. 19, vs. Chicago on Christmas Day, and vs. Seattle on New Year's Day, will go out to an exclusive national audience.
- ▶ All four Packers games in November, during the traditional ratings period, could air from coast to coast, on three of the four networks.
- ▶ Disadvantages? Well, noon kickoffs, most fans' preferred starting times, are becoming rare. This year, there are five, and only two at home.
- ▶ In 2004, the Packers played 17 games, including postseason, and 14 were televised to the largest national audience possible.

**ONLY A BRIEF STAY:** Dusting off the bleachers, the Packers on Nov. 6 hosted a game at Lambeau Field for the first time in 28 days. Green Bay is home this week for its only road game in a four-game stretch. Over a longer period, Monday marks only the Packers' second home tilt during a seven-game stretch. Before Monday, the team will have played just one home game during a 42-day period.

### Longest scoring streaks, NFL

Seattle shut out San Francisco Sept. 26, 2004, ending the 49ers' NFL-record 420-game scoring streak. The Packers' streak, now at 226, is second on the active list and joined the longest all-time streaks in 2004...The last team to blank Green Bay was Chicago, Oct. 17, 1991 (10-0 at Lambeau)...On Oct. 7, 2001, at Tampa, the Packers broke the previous franchise record, 156 games (Nov. 9, 1958 — Dec. 21, 1969).

**ROOKIES PLAYING PLENTY OF ROLES:** Patrick Dendy Sunday became the 12th rookie used in a game by the Packers this season.

**ANOTHER STARTING RB:** With Tony Fisher inactive Nov. 6 and Nov. 13, the Packers in only nine games have started five running backs. Ahman Green (quadriceps tendon) and Najeh Davenport (broken ankle) are both on injured reserve. Fisher sustained a freak rib injury Oct. 30 at Cincinnati. Samkon Gado was starter No. 5 last Sunday at Atlanta, following ReShard Lee's starting debut Nov. 6 vs. Pittsburgh.

► The last time Green Bay started as many as four backs in a season was 1998, when Dorsey Levens (4), Raymont Harris (3), Travis Jervey (5) and Darick Holmes (4) drew starting assignments.

**THIRD-DOWN DEFENSE:** The Packers' defense against Pittsburgh Nov. 6 gave up just 13 points, 213 total yards and zero third-down conversions (0-for-8). The last time the Packers did not allow an opponent to convert on third down was Dec. 20, 1997, when Green Bay held Buffalo to 0-for-12 in a 31-21 win.

► Actually, the Packers didn't allow a third-down conversion over six full quarters, since the first half at Cincinnati Oct. 30. The streak (0-for-14) ended on Atlanta's third possession Nov. 13, with about 5 minutes left in the first stanza.

► Opponents are 4-for-their-last-24 on third down.

**A GENERATION OF WINNING RECORDS:** Forgive Packers fans if they tend to come down harder on their team than fans in other cities. The club hasn't had a losing record since 1991. And, figuring that an entire generation of fans aren't old enough to remember 1991, the team's start is tough to swallow.

► But don't count out the Favre-led Packers, who have never grouped themselves in the "most teams" category when facing adversity.

**UNANSWERED:** Lost in the aftermath of a heartbreaking loss Oct. 23 at Minnesota was the Packers' streak of 69 unanswered points (52 vs. New Orleans Oct. 9, and 17 at Minnesota).

► Elias Sports Bureau research indicates that the Packers' streak was the longest in the NFL since 2000.

► Tennessee was the last club to reach 69, scoring 76 unanswered points from Dec. 10 to Dec. 25, 2000. Also that year, Jacksonville put up 75 straight points from Nov. 26-Dec. 10.

► No NFC team had as long of a streak since Detroit also scored 69 nine years ago.

## MONDAY MARKS ANNIVERSARY OF LONE TIE IN 44-YEAR OLD RIVALRY

For the participants, Monday night's Packers matchup with the Minnesota Vikings in Lambeau Field will be historic, regardless of the outcome.

The Vikings, who made their first regular season visit to Green Bay in 1962 (it was City Stadium then, three years prior to being renamed Lambeau Field), will be paying their 30th visit to Titledown, a milestone in which both teams can take a modicum of pride.

The Purple Gang, it should be noted, also has made 15 other regular season appearances against the Green and Gold in Milwaukee (between 1961 and 1994, after which the Packers opted for playing all of their home games in Green Bay).

The Vikings made their first Green Bay showing on Sept. 16, 1962, under their second-year head coach, Norm Van Brocklin, previously one of the NFL's premier quarterbacks.

The Packers, en route to the best club record in team history (13-1), won that one, 34-7, controlling the football throughout with a 191-yard rushing performance, 75 of those yards contributed by Jim Taylor, 67 by Paul Hornung.

In addition to marking the Vikings' 30th visit, Monday night's clash also will be the approximate anniversary of the only tie game in the 44-year history of the rivalry, which spans 88 games.

That lone deadlock was played in "Lambeau" on the afternoon of Nov. 26, 1978, when the Packers and the Minnesotans dueled to a 10-10 stand-off in overtime.

Considering that the Packers had limited their guests to a field goal and were leading 10-3 as the 2-minute mark arrived in the fourth quarter on that occasion, their chances of prevailing appeared to be reasonably bright, with the Vikings taking possession of the football at their own 43-yard line following a David Beverly punt.

But Vikings quarterback Fran Tarkenton, who had become somewhat notorious for his come-from-behind skills, presided over an 11-play scoring drive capped by a 5-yard touchdown pass to Ahmad Rashad into the left corner of the end zone with only 6 seconds left in regulation.

Minnesota placekicker Rick Danmeier then delivered the extra point to tie it at 10 and send the game into overtime.

Both teams subsequently had an opportunity to win it in sudden death but, in each case, their kicking specialists faltered with the game on the line.

Danmeier was wide left from only 19 yards, customarily tantamount to a "gimnee," early in the overtime and never had another opportunity.

The Packers' Chester Marcol, meanwhile, had to wait until the final minute of the "fifth" quarter before his chance came. He, too, was off target, his 40-yard effort veering wide right with only 21 seconds left in overtime.

In a historical sidelight, the Packers' Terrell Middleton, a second-year running back from Memphis State, set a club record by making 39 rushing attempts—a mark he still holds. He proceeded to close out the afternoon with 110 hard-earned yards.

Middleton earlier had scored the Packers' lone touchdown of the game by way of a 1-yard run in the second quarter, capping a 12-play, 70-yard drive engineered by quarterback David Whitehurst.

Middleton also caught two passes for 20 yards to emerge as the team's overall offensive leader with 130 yards, accounting for better than a third of Green Bay's 318 net yards.

With those collective 41 "handles" (39 carries and two receptions) Middleton continues to own the Packers' all-time record for most com-



bined attempts in a single game, 27 years later.

At that point in the '78 campaign, Middleton was en route to a 1,000-yard season, then only the 10th such season in team history. He went on to close out the year with 1,116 yards in a then team-record 284 attempts.

Rookie wide receiver James Lofton, in the midst of launching his bid for an ultimate berth in the Pro Football Hall of Fame, had to be content with one reception for 24 yards.

Although the 10-10 standoff remains the only tie in the Packers' stoutly contested rivalry with the Vikings, the long-time antagonists since have gone into overtime on five other occasions in the series.

Unfortunately for the Green and Gold, the Vikings have won four of those five contests, 27-21 at Metropolitan Stadium in Bloomington, Minn., Sept. 23, 1979; 20-17 in Lambeau Field Oct. 13, 1983; 23-20, also in "Lambeau," on Sept. 6, 1991; and 13-10 in the Minneapolis Metrodome Oct. 20, 1994.

The Packers finally stemmed the overtime tide in 2000 when wideout Antonio Freeman pulled off his memorable "on-the-back" reception, rising from the turf to convert his uncanny catch into a 26-10 victory over the Vikings — their first OT triumph at Minnesota's expense.

In that '78 season which produced the lone deadlock in series history, Bart Starr's Packers went on to tie the Vikings for first place in the NFC Central Division at season's end.

But Minnesota had won their first meeting of the season, 21-7, and having thus defeated and tied Green Bay in their annual home-and-home series, qualified for the playoffs while the Packers had to stay home for the holidays.

As division champions, the Vikings were exempt from the NFC's Wild Card playoffs, but fell to the Los Angeles Rams in a divisional playoff two weeks later, 34-10.

\* \* \*

— IT SPEAKS FOR ITSELF: The overall record in the series, which shows the Packers with a one-game advantage in the 88-game history of the rivalry (44 wins to 43 losses), speaks eloquently for itself.

And so, most assuredly, does the scoring differential the Packers and the Purple launched their competitive relationship in 1961.

It reveals that the Packers, who have outscored the Vikings by a narrow, 118-point margin over that span (1,818 to 1,700), thus find themselves separated by a modest average of 1.34 points per game over the history of the 44-year series.

\* \* \*

— If post-season play is taken into account, the rivalry is all even at 44-44-1, the Vikings having won the teams' first playoff encounter following the '04 season, 31-17.
